BRIEF SUMMARY OF THE MINUTES OF BOTH THE TWO SEPARATE MEETINGS – THE 'COUNCIL MEETING, FOLLOWED BY THE A.G.M. HELD ON THE 14th JULY 2012

This year "Federation Day" was held at St. Saviour's Church Hall, Folkestone. The Chairman, Chrissie Baker welcomed 29 delegates, representing (only) 13 clubs, with apologies from 7 delegates. In Michael Thompson's absence, due to his holiday, the minutes were taken by Grahame Boutle.

The Hon Treasurer, Colin Tobitt reported that affiliation fees, based on a per capita basis were down from 972 in 2011, to 883 in 2012. Surprisingly, the venue hire fee for Paddock Wood, in March, had still not been invoiced, so he had not been able to finalise the accounts for that event just yet. He reminded delegates that the stock purchase of over £200 worth of NVI G.B. first class postage stamps, prior to the last rate increase, did not mean that mail was necessarily being sent by 1st class post. It was used as a "make up" rate, unless the particular item was urgent. The Bulletin Editor, Peter O'Keeffe reported that the 'Word processor' on which the Bulletin had been typed over the last 20 years had now died, and was uneconomic to repair. He would have to convert to a computer, which might take a little longer for him to get used to. He also mentioned that a report had been received from one club, without quoting it's name, or the sender. Fortunately he guessed correctly after reference to the Club Programme Directiory.

Grahame Boutle reported that the responses to the Questionaires handed out to the dealers who attended the Spring Rally indicated that due to the lack of public transport, it would probably not be in the interests of the Federation to continue to use the Mascall's school. Obviously, not being close to a High street, there was unlikely to be any passing traffic, and the general public were unlikely to 'pop in'. (We all knew this, but how many non interested general public even bother to visit a rally any way?) Grahame also reported that arrangements for the Autumn Rally were well advanced, There would be 19 dealers, and 'fliers' were to be sent to every affiliated club with the next issue of the Bulletin.

Maurice Flack (President) reported, as Competition Secretary, that Kent had again hosted the Dawes Cup, but may find it necessary to host it yet again in 2013, as the Sussex Federation may not be able to do so!

The Election of Officers and Executive Committee brought forward two nominees for the Chairmanship, Chrissie Baker (current chairman) and Judith French, both left the room and their merits were discussed, both were invited back to state their views, and Following a secret vote Chrissie was confimed as Chairman. Tony Bosworth then announced that in the circumstances, Michael Thompson was standing down as Hon. Secretary. No nominations were forthcoming for this unexpected vacancy. other Officers were re-elected 'en bloc'. Don Brookfield was re-appointed as Accounts Examiner. It was announced that Len Lasseter (Orpington & KPHG) had been warded the Lingley Shield, for services to both societies. Due to his absence, the presentation would be made at a club event in the next season. (later arranged for 12th September.) Colin Smith (Malling) paid tribute to Mike Thompson for his services to the Federation, and to various clubs that Mike belonged to, and congratulated him on his being awarded the ABPS Award of Merit for 2012. (This incidently, was nominated by Malling S/C (not KFPS as shown in the ABPS Journal). Possible future Seminars include topics Booklets, Boer War, Mediterranean islands, but the Seminar by Gavin Fryer scheduled for November 24th has been cancelled due to unavailability. P.S. A further note appears elsewhere in this issue.

This will be on Saturday, 27th October 2012 when IAN NUTLEY will lead a discussion entitled COLLECTING ZEPPELIN MAIL. This will be held at the Wainscott Memorial Hall, (ME2 4LG) Holley Road, Wainscott, Near Rochester

Commencing at 10am (Doors open from 9am) it is expected to finish about 4pm There will be Tea and Coffee breaks, plus a buffet lunch, and the cost is £12.

Lunch is usually from 12.30 to 1.30 pm. There is free car parking in the road or on the driveway at the venue.

NOTE The Seminar scheduled for November 24th (by Gavin Fryer) has had to be cancelled, as the speakers wife is to have an operation, and he is unable to guarantee his availability. This is the same date as the Kent Postal History Group Auction, so you could attend that - its free, but take your own lunch!

Other Seminars being considered for 2013, include Booklet Collecting, the Boer War, and Mediterranean Islands. It is also hoped that Gavin Fryer can join us again sometime next year.




I was in PARIS for a philatelic event (of course), staying in a modest little hotel near the rue Drouot, which I am sure you all know is the home of many Parisian stamp shops, although sadly not as many as there once were. It was mid-afternoon, which gave me time to take a walk down there before they began

to close. At the second or third shop I spotted in the window a single copy of a British Intelligence Forgery of a wartime French definitive. I had all of these in complete sheets of 20, but what I had never found was a Maquis forgery of a definitive, the 1Fr 50 brown with DeGaulle's head, instead of Petain's. I therefore entered the shop, more in hope than expectation, and asked the proprietor if he might have such a stamp.

"Mais oui, Monsieur" he replied, and produced a small stock-book, which he opened to reveal about 10 copies! I gleefully selected a nice copy from the corner of the sheet, and was reaching for my wallet when he said "Would Monsieur be interested in a complete sheet of 9?"



Hardly able to contain my joy, I gazed upon the next page of his stock-book where lay 2 such pieces. Before I could effusively thank him, and with a twinkle in his eye, he added "And perhaps a copy on cover?". I thought I'd died and gone to heaven, as he revealed just one, used on a cover dated in Cannes in 1943! This was beyond my wildest, and my French did not stretch to thanking him adequately. This sort of thing seems not to happen to me any more, but every time I display my WWII propaganda and espionage forgeries I cannot resist telling this little anecodate. I have been in the same shop since and found absolutely nothing.

The Romney Marsh Philatelic & Postcard Society

With our first scheduled meeting of 2012 cancelled due to the iced up car park, we first met on the 29th February when our Chairman, Derek Martin showed us some of his collection of China; stamps, covers and postcards, covering subjects such as Watermills, the making of Ceramics, Dress & Culture. In March, our Postcard Competition was well supported, and our thanks to Mr and Mrs

Egon for giving up their evening to judge for us. Winners were Derek Martin, Richard Mittell and Kathy Carr. Also in March, our member, John Edwards gave us an excellent display of Postcards. As well as our local Romney, Hythe & Dymchurch Railway, we saw Camber Trams, Railways of the South East, and shipwrecks, plus Lifeboats from Ramsgate to Hastings. April started off with the sad news of the passing of Ann May, a member from the start of our Society. Our first meeting in April was the Philatelic Competition, rather poorly supported, but the winners were Gerrie Bates, and Richard Mittell. Then came our A.G.M. in May, with everyone remaining "in office". There was a lively discussion about advertising and attracting new members.

June saw the welcome return of Frank & Pat Parsons, who entertained us with "Mourning Mail" from Queen Victoria through to George VI. Pat later showed cards of prison buildings, going back to the 11th Century. These included drawings done by prisoners. Frank displayed early Syrian stamps, a country we had not seen before, and this was followed by a display of Military Hospitals in Brighton, where Religion and colour seemed to be kept separate. Stewart Henderson came all the way from Essex to see us, and displayed stamps, post-cards, labels and notices in "Aspects of W.W.I."... He showed how governments raised the revenue to help pay the costs of war, and covered the conesquences of wars, with Empires breaking up, and new countries emerging, their first overprints, and their first "new" issue of stamps. He had one small set of postcards tracing one soldiers war, from his enlistment through to his demob. Our last meeting of the season was an opportunity for members to show off their "new acquisitions", then we look forward to the start of a new season, commencing on the 12th September.



Edenbridge Stamp & Postcard Club In April, we were pleasantly surprised when Chrissie Baker brought her "World of Stamps" to display to us. She said that there were some 2200\2500 countries and the way she had written them up was so different. Our small number of members present all enjoyed the evening. In May Ray Barton entertained us with "Mexico Postal History", showing covers and sets of stamps - another interesting display. Our season concluded with our A.G.M. and "open evening". At the moment, we are not sure where we will be meeting next season, as the

building we have been using, is up for sale for development and the new Community Centre, which is being built, has been delayed by the dreadful rainy weather. This was being considered as a possible venue. Future visitors will of course be advised in good time, where we set up a new home, as will our members.

Medway Towns Philatelic Society Despairing of persuading more members to enter our competitions, we tried out an idea which other clubs might care to copy or adopt. After the serious competition entries had been studied, the trophies awarded and tea made, we announced what would happen next. Each member had been asked to bring along about twenty stamps (they had no idea why!) that they no longer wanted, and the Committee provided another hundred or so. From the combined mix, numerous "packets of some thirty stamps were compiled.

Each member was then provided with a small album page, some and a packet of stamps and asked to make up an interesting page. They were allowed to swap, with others, or with any left in the kitty, and when they had finished, they were asked to give their "entry" a title, then put their page up on the display boards. The idea worked surprisingly well, several had never used hinges before, most had not submitted a competition entry before, but all seemed to enjoy the session, and one person was heard to exclaim "This is FUN". Titles of some of the completed pages included, The Map of Europe, Evolution, Outposts of Empire, as well as more predictable names, such as Birds, Kings and Queens. The winner, judged by those present, was an extremely neat display,

POSTAL DELIVERY ROUTES An article in my local paper states that the Postal Deliveries to the TN9, TN10, TN11 and TN12 postcode areas are set to change in the next few weeks. This could mean customers receiving their post later than at present. I am in TN10; over the last 6 months, I have received my Post at varying times, ranging between 8.15am (once) and 7.45 PM. (also once). So presumably 'later', means next day, unless the Postman is on overtime! This is "To maintain efficiency and keep prices low". They also state that "Many customers will continue to get their mail by lunchtime"
