SWALE PHILATELIC & POSTCARD CLUB On January 19th Chris Rapley, a club member and stamp fair organiser entertained 25 members with a collection of stamp



covers formed by Dale Howting, the Sittingbourne Charity fund raiser. The covers had been sent to various dignitaries world wide to obtain signatures, which were then sold for charity. Chris then showed Cycle Mail, a voluntary service run by Clacton on Sea County High School, a charity collection and delivery service initiated in 1982. The display ended with a colourful collection of postcards of Penshurst village, nr Tunbridge Wells, plus some cartoon cards and beer mats. Our member, Francis Howland gave a photographic dislay of 'Trains and Planes' on February, highlighting the Sittingbourne to Queenborough line (and extension to Sheerness), which was started in 1860. The display of planes covered the first aircraft factory, next to Mussel Manor which became the Aero Club, where Winston Churchill learnt to fly. In 1912, a Lt. Samson performed the first take off from a special deck on H.M.S. Africa, anchored in Sheerness harbour. Ron Burn was our guest on February 16th, displaying Tristan da Cunha covering the period of the volcano 1961/3 when the inhabitants had to leave the island, and were brought to Britain. He gave a detailed history and his depth of knowledge is hard to pay justice to in a brief report. Bob Appleton showed postcards of Cobham Village on March 8th, plus Shorne & Chalk, all steeped in history of the Dickens era Cobham Hall, built between 1584 and 1670, and one of its owners was Ivo Bligh, 8th Earl of Darnley, Captain of the English cricket team in Australia that was given the urn containing 'The Ashes'. Our visiting speaker for the 22nd March was unable to join us, so at short notice, members Shaun Caveney, Bryan Clark and Bob Browne produced displays of Sittingbourne postmarks, G.B. modern mechanisation and stamp show items, and a History of Kent on stamps and cards, respectively. On April 5th, Robert Turcan displayed cards and photo's of Dover



BEXLEY PHILATELIC SOCIETY Our 2012 meetings kicked off with a 2 page competition and displays by a few members. The competition produced 11 entries, which Mike Thompson won with souvenir labels of the 1912 Margate Philatelic Congress. John Corderoy's thematic entry 'Coconuts' was runner up. First visiting speaker of the year was Cliff Gregory, showing India starting with an underpaid item, charged 6d in 1858 on a letter from the U.K. this was shared equally,

between the two countries until India joined the U.P.U. in 1868. Next was a visit by Gilbert Denton, showing 'Luxembourg' which was something of a European crossroads, having the dubious honour of having been invaded from all sides. Our speaker mentioned that this state was established after the Napoleonic wars, and was notable for having three heads of state who abdicated. February 9th, member Brian Stalker showed "Labrador", one of his many 'Canadian' collections, Brian also included several photographs of his latest trip to the area, plus many detailed and rare postmarks. As we expected, we were fully briefed on the early Mail Services in use in Labrador, and of the problems they encountered. Again a well prepared and most interesting story. On March 8th, we enjoyed a visit by Frank and Pat Parsons, Frank showing his favourite collction of Brighton Postal History with a number of postcard illustrations of the town over the years. Pat then showed 'Revenues', an interesting and somewhat surprising accumulation of stamps/labels which many of us had never seen before. Both displays created much interest and were well presented. Derek Hamilton Smith gave us a really varied selection of 'Postal History - covers of the World' on April 12th, many of which the audience had never seen before. If Derek likes a cover, whether it be rare or not, he will include it which must encourage others to do the same. On May 10th, our member Colin Evans who has rarely publicised his collection of the U.S.A was persuaded to show it; many of us were surprised at the extent of it, the quality, and the background story. Colin included early covers, Revenues & various Tax stamps, Civil War items and virtually full ranges of definitive stamps up to the 1950's, plus Air-Mails, Parcel Post, Special Delivery, and Newspaper stamps, excluding the most of the commemoratives. An excellent display ! Our morning meetings continue to be well supported, but we do have room for a few more. On February 16th, Ian Nutley displayed his 'Concentration Camp Mail', some very rare items, and some with a disturbing background, but a most interesting story. On March 15th Fred Hoadley showed 'Aspects of Swiss Philately', again of particular interest to several members, who had visited many of the areas The display of "1940, A Desperate Year" shown Fred illustrated. by Jim Etherington on 19th of April brought back memories of most members attending, as it was 'in their lifetime'. WHAT DAY WAS IT ?

How to find out which day of the week an item was posted, or an event occurred.

(With acknowledgements to the G.B. Overprints Society. This article appeared in their Journal c 1982)

Ron Goodfellow came forward with a system for checking out the day of the week for any year you care to mention. Was that Levant Steamer cover posted on a Thursday or Sunday? This system will tell you.

Take the last two figures of the year concerned: add a quarter of this number, ignoring any remainder: add the day of the month: add the following number, according to the month; Jan 1 (in Leap year, use 0), Feb 4 (leap year use 3), March 4, April 0, May 2, June 5, July 0, Aug 3, Sept 6, Oct 1, Nov 4, and Dec 6. Then for the 1700,s add 4, the 1800,s add 2, the 1900,s add 0, in the 2000, add 6 Divide the total by 7, and the remainder gives the day of the week, eg 1 for Sunday, 2 for Monday, etc. with Saturday at 0.. For example, if your total is 51, divide by 7, which is 7 leaving a remainder of 2, which is Monday.

Baffled? ? Try it out, it does work.



All 26 stamps (1st class) in the "Jubilee Year" set publicising 'Great Britain', are illustrated here as issued in the Souvenir sheet. They show alphabetically A to Z, man made constructions, except for letter 'W' (the White Cliffs at Dover) which are regarded as 'National Monuments', which are well worthy of sight-seeing by tourists. Alphabetically A to L were issued earlier, now M to Z follow.

Additionally in the souvenir sheet, there are 4 stamp sized labels one in each corner to represent each of the four countries of the U.K. i.e England - The Houses of Parliament, Wales - The National Assembly, Scotland - the Scottish Parliament, Northern Ireland -I think that the designers had a very easy job, their Assembly. but this issue is good publicity for Britain.

This A to Z composite 'Souvenir Sheet' shows each of the chosen sites in their true colours and contains all the 26 first class stamps, plus four non postally valid labels. sold at £11.96 (ie 26 x 46p), but now costing £15.60. (26 x 60p) ****************

THE DIAMOND JUBILEE On the 31st May, the Royal Mail are issuing 8 stamps to mark the six decades of the Queen's reign. Four are in full colour and four are in black and white. The values planned, before the recent price Rises were two x first class, two x 68p, two x 76p, and two x £1.10. Printed by De La Rue using the gravure process. In addition, there will be a Prestige booklet which will include four of the "Wilding" 1/- brown design with a 1st class face value in se-tenent format with the most recent grey 1st class definitive stamps. The booklet has self adhesive stamps and has been printed by Walsall Security Printing.



CHARLES DICKENS 1812—1870

BIRTH BI-CENTENARY ISSUE

On the 19th June, the Royal Mail are issuing six stamps, featuring Dickens characters and a miniature sheet of four stamps showing original scenes from 4 of his books. The stamps are printed on a cream paper, with a buff coloured background, and have face values of 1st and 2nd class, 77p, 87p, £1.26, and £1.90. They show Mr. Bumble, Mr. Pickwick, the Marchioness, Mrs. Gamp, Captain Cuttle, and Mr. Micawber. (two of the stamps are illustrated alongside). The stamps in the miniature





sheet are all 1st class values and are coloured black and grey. facsimile of Dickens signature.

It seems that the general public rarely buy (or even know about these new issues) how often do you get them on your mail? Business firms and many stamp dealers don't use them these days. One wonders, does the Post Office advertise them enough?

WHAT THE POST OFFICE DOES IF YOU DON'T COLLECT MAIL!

Do you ever send recorded delivery? Make sure it is not destroyed in Belfast!

As a recently qualified electrician, the training provider sent my certificates to me by recorded delivery. Unfortunately I had just gone away on a fortnight's holiday the day before a delivery and when I returned of course it was now after the 7 day window for collection/redelivery.

I contacted the sender on my return and was told that the packet would be returned to them and they would re-send it to me, but this could take up to 12 weeks. If I hadn't received the item by then I should contact them again.

12 weeks later I still had not received the certificate and I needed it for my forthcoming registration inspection. I contacted the sender again and was told that it hadn't been returned to them and 'chances are it was still at my local post office'. They gave me the identification number and told me to check with the Post Office System. One telephone call later the automated voice told me that the item was at my local sorting office.

Did you ever think about what happens to the item if it was not delivered and not collected?

I jumped into my car and raced to the sorting office in Sandwich and explained the problem to the member of staff. His immediate response was "it won't be 'ere lov, but I'll check the system!"

A minute later he returned with a piece of paper and said "no it's not 'ere – it's been sent to Belfast!"

"So how can I do I get it from Belfast?" I asked

"Chances are it's been destroyed by now – all uncollected mail goes there and if they can't trace the sender it get's destroyed. If it had had the sender's details on it – it would have been returned from 'ere."

He did however give me the printout with 17 undelivered items listed on it that does provide some potentially useful information! At my local sorting office the uncollected items seem to be reviewed/dealt with once a week. If the item has a return address on them it can take up to 8 weeks to be returned to the sender.

If however it has **no** return address then it can sent to Belfast in as little as 7 days – my own was sent after 14 days.

Lessons for everyone!

So if you missed your 7 day deadline for collection it would still be worth your while visiting the sorting office. But more importantly if you are sending something recorded delivery and you don't won't it destroyed in Belfast put your return address on it!!!

And as to what happened to my certificate? A new one has been ordered for me and should arrive in four weeks!!!

STOLEN POST BOXES

Further to the brief note on page six I now learn from the 'Courier', my local newspaper, that other post boxes have been stolen in West Kent and East Sussex.

Lionel Jones of the 'Sussex Postal History Society' has reported that a full size pillar box (around 6 feet tall, in cast iron, of the Victorian type) is offered for sale on E-bay for £5,000, and even a small wall or pole mounted box could realise £500.

It is believed they could be 'stolen to order' as some collectors want them as garden ornaments ! In addition to the box stolen in Hadlow, (bearing the KGVI arms) on April 20th, a similar box was stolen from 'Summersales', London Road, Crowborough a week or so A Royal Mail spokesperson said that the box had been cleared the day before so hopefully no mail would have been lost. It has also come to light that a third box, one sited at 'Mardens Hill' in Crowborough was also stolen on April 28th.

The newspaper also reports that a box was stolen from Burwash in February this year, and one stolen in Brenchly in 2007, has not been replaced. Perhaps they were taken for their metal content! You will be pleased to learn that the Police are investigating all these incidents. If you have one of this type of box near you, keep an eye out for it's well being. I attended a stamp auction at Seaford several years ago, and remember a wall type box being offered for sale at £30 - I think it raised £45 - there were two If one is offered bidders. Perhaps I should have bid for it! in your club auction, be wary, before buying it, especially if it does not have a key ! PJOK.


