

I recently referred to a Website about the Science Museum which began with the following. The Science Museum galleries are stuffed with over 15 thousand objects, however more than 170 thousand items are hidden away in Blythe House. (This is the former HQ of the Post Office Savings Bank). Many of these have never been on public display. It continues - there are over 90 rooms in total spread over five floors which are used as a storage area filled floor to ceiling with thousands of weird and wonderful things that most people will never see. Their words, not mine.

One of the pleasures of our hobby is sharing our collection and knowledge with others - I personally like nothing more than being asked to give a display. Putting your albums on a shelf and keeping the contents to yourself is, in a way, similar to a museum which puts it in storage.

Ashford PS is the custodian of the Samuel Graveson Postal History collection of pre-stamp covers to and from Kent and I recall that some years ago when I updated the club scrapbook it referred to the fact that before moving to Wye from Hertfordshire, Mr Graveson donated his collection of Hertfordshire Postal History to a local museum. When revisiting the museum he was surprised that his collection was not on display and enquired why this was so and was told it was stored in the Museum archives. At a later date, and not wanting the same fate to befall his Kent collection, i.e. he wanted it to be appreciated by others - he offered it gratis to Bob Browne, who was Hon Sec of Ashford PS at the time. Bob expressed his thanks and said he would not accept it as a personal gift but agreed to accept it for and on behalf of the Society.

Taking into account the time and expense we spend searching for material to enhance our collections, I am sure that the majority of us would also like our stamps, covers etc. to be made available for others to appreciate and enjoy. I am not suggesting that we donate or give away our collections but we really should leave instructions for its eventual disposal and advise our dependents to seek advice, be it from a trusted fellow member/s of your Society, a favourite dealer or maybe an Auction House. Have I have left instructions for the disposal of my collections/accumulations? No, I haven't - but I promise that by the time you read this I will have done so.

The subject matter of my letter reminds me that Ray Barton (Ashford PS) made similar comments in a previous issue of the Bulletin. And finally - Congratulations to Ray for his letter being featured as Letter of the Month in the June issue of Stamp Magazine. This is the second time he has received this accolade.

Editor's Note: Collectors should learn from this that it is not recommended that your collection should be left to a Society, Town or an Association without giving them the authority to dispose of it. It can cause more problems than its worth if Trustees have to keep it, as storage, insurance and security can be costly. Who can exhibit it, museums probably do not have the 'know how' to write it up, and few have the space to display it. You should advise your Executor to sell it, thereby giving other collectors the opportunity to acquire it and enjoy the hunt as you did. PJOK

NEW ISSUES

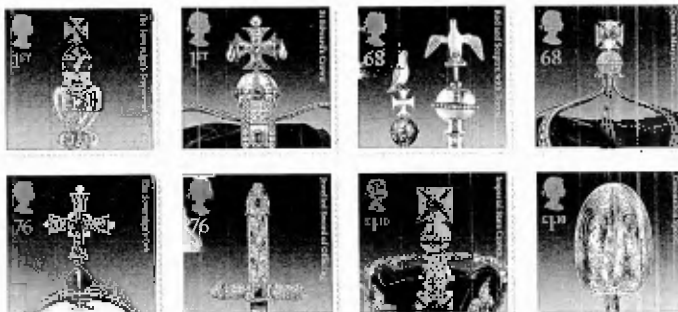
Its now just under 12 months to go until the Olympic Games (and Paralympics) take place in 'London'. As might have been expected, the Royal Mail are cashing in on the event, (almost like the Millennium,) by issuing yet another group of 10 stamps. This is the third year that sets of 10 stamps have been issued - one wonders how many will they produce next year ! Back in 1948, the last time the Olympics were held in London, we had a set of just 4 stamps, the total cost being 1/11½d (say all of 10p) even I could afford that ! If anyone is collecting the Olympic issues now, the current cost so far is NOW at least £13.80 for the basic stamps. In addition there are booklets, generic sheetlets, First Day Covers, and it seems 'Mixed Packs'. The latest set of 10, all first class value stamps, was issued on the 27th July. I would guess that few of the general public will ever see all of these stamps. The Royal Mail are even offering cash discounts when you buy certain quantities of the numerous permutations they are wanting to persuade you to buy.



They state that the 30 stamps issued over the 3 years period 2009 to 2011 are to mark the '30th Olympiad' and this is the last group to be issued ! But how many more are they planning for 2012 ?

CROWN JEWELS

On the 23rd August we get a set of 8 stamps featuring these "Historic National Treasures" - the cost of the basic stamps is £6.00. made up of 2 @ 1st class, 2 x 68p, 2 x 76p and 2 x £1.10. These rates being 68p for letters to Europe up to 20g, 76p for Rest of World letters up to 10g, and £1.10 for Rest of World letters up to 20g. (see 'Letters' page for comments)



MORE NEW ISSUES

For those of you interested in the "POST & GO" stamps, the Royal Mail are making a fourth (and apparently final) issue (new designs) on the 16th September. As before, there will be six stamps, costing £2.76. They will be available (unless they still have stocks of the earlier issue still in stock) from the 'Post & Go' machines in selected Post Office branches, or from the Post Office Bureau at Tallents House in Edinburgh.



It does not seem that many people are using the 'Post & Go' labels. I have not seen any used so far

MORE SLIT STAMPS

No doubt collectors of the Machin stamps will know that in January 2011, five other values with the 'U' shape slits were issued - these are similar to those on the 1st & 2nd class definitives already in use. They are 1p, 2p, 5p, 10p and 20p values. They are self adhesives.

ANOTHER POST OFFICE CASH COW ?

On September 14th, the Post Office will be issuing another Souvenir sheet, but this time it will have 10 First class definitive 'Machin' stamps to mark the 100th Anniversary of the birth of Arnold Machin. It looks as though these will not be self adhesive: presumably they will not have the 'U' slits in them !

AND THERE'S MORE !

On September 9th, we are to have an Aerial Post Miniature sheet of four stamps, values 1st, 68p, £1 and £1.10. Plus a 'Prestige' Stamp booklet (cost £9.97) containing a variety of 8 definitive stamps and it looks like a block of four QEII 'Castle' design stamps with a face value of 50p each. These are to mark the 100 years since the first United Kingdom Aerial Post in 1911. They also have a reproduction of a KGV 'Downey' head

AGE OF THE HANOVERIANS

On September 15th we get a set of 6 stamps, being the fifth of the 'Kings & Queens' series of stamps. They have portraits of George I, George II, George III, William IV, and a young Queen Victoria. The respective values are 1st, 1st, 76p, 76p, £1.10, and £1.10. There is also a Miniature sheet showing Robert Walpole, (1st), the Dome of Kedleston Hall, (68p) a Penny Black stamp (76p) and a much older Queen Victoria (£1). The stamps in the miniature sheet are illustrated below, plus that of the young Queen Victoria on the £1.10 stamp.

SEVENOAKS & DISTRICT P.S. Our May meeting was a most interesting display of Jamaica, by Steve Jarvis from the Official start of a Postal Service on the Island in 1858 through to the 1930's. We saw a wide variety of stamps and covers, including many teche-bete blocks, through to early Airmails. Our A.G.M. was held on 1st June, when Maurice Short retired as President after five years, to be succeeded by Peter O'Keefe. Gilbert Denton also retired, as Packet Secretary, after 15 years, but as yet his replacement has not been found. It is hoped that a member, who is not able to take on this job until the New Year, will take over this task. The remainder of the Officers and Committee were re-elected, Gilbert continuing on the Committee. Our member Gordon Darby corresponds with a Junior School Stamp Club in Sri Lanka, sending them stamps donated by our members, and Gordon gave an up to date report on how this is progressing. Our other school, the local Amerhurst Junior School has been introduced via the website to the Sri Lanka school, and they keep in touch. Any spare stamps are passed to these schools. After the AGM, an Auction was conducted by Maurice Porter. On the 6th July, the retiring President, Maurice Short had invited Peter O'Keefe to give his final "Presidents Night" display, which turned out to be 'Forces Mail of WWII'. This included material relating to the B.E.F. prior to Dunkirk, mail to and from forces in North Africa, Prisoner of War letters and cards from British forces held in Italy and Germany, mail from Royal Navy and R.A.F. personnel. Airgraphs & 'V' Mail, Honour envelopes, and even items to and from Germans held in the U.K. as late as early 1949. This ended our season as we have no meeting in August. The next season commences on Wednesday, 7th September with competitions - letters 'O, P, & Q' being for ..?, plus any new acquisitions, and a bourse

1989, a set of four stamps were issued by the Royal Mail with vertical designs showing 'Ironbridge', in Shropshire (19p) a Tin Mine at St Agnes Head, Cornwall. (27p), Cotton Mills, at New Lanark in Strathclyde, (32p) and Pontveyslyt Aqueduct, Clwyd (35p). Three weeks later they issued a miniature sheet with the same design stamps, but now in a horizontal format. How many G.B. collectors have got these horizontal stamps in their collections? The Mini sheet was sold to raise funds for the "STAMP WORLD LONDON '90' INTERNATIONAL STAMP EXHIBITION". I wonder how many of these postally used exist, other than on first day covers? The illustration above has been enlarged to show the additional detail on each of the stamps more clearly.

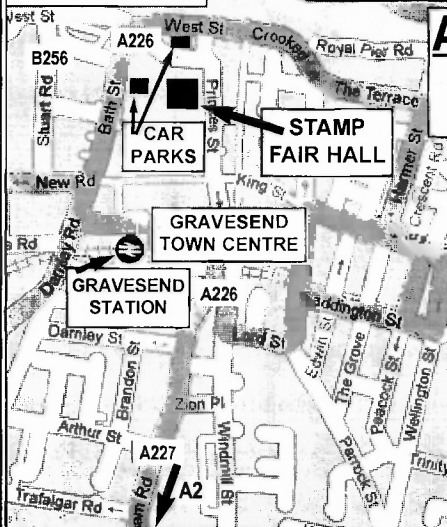

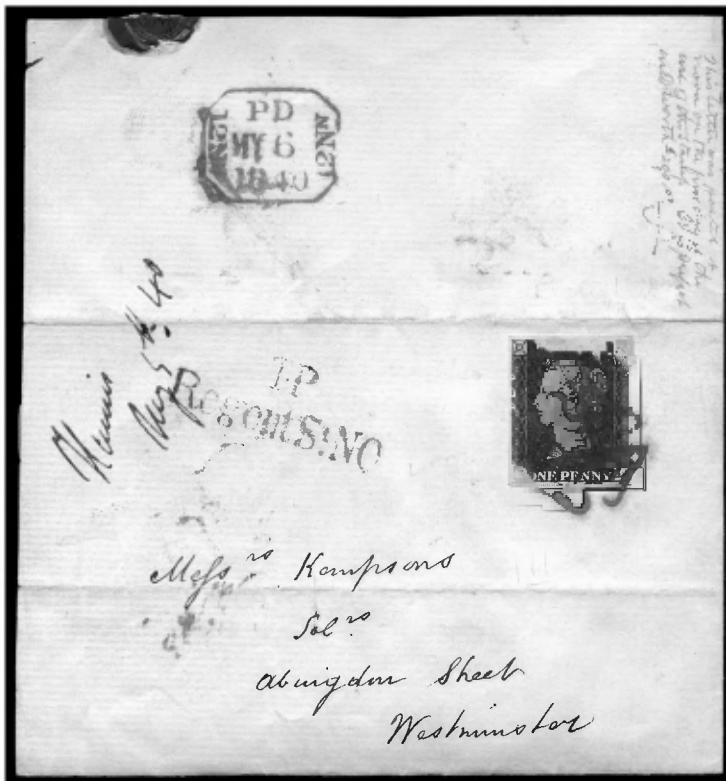
